### POLICY, RESEARCH, AND NEWS TRACKING

#### Industry Perceptions and Awareness

<u>Canadians trust farmers despite high food costs</u>—for now. Rising food prices have been drawing the ire of the Canadian public, but the bulk of that frustration and anger is not directed at farmers. While food retailers are viewed unfavourably, farmers remain one of the most trusted demographics in the food system, according to the latest Canadian Centre for Food Integrity consumer trust survey. However, that trust is at risk. Lack of understanding about food production and the workings of food supply systems poses risks to the high levels of public trust in Canadian farmers. Read more...

Honesty key in building public trust through food marketing. Canadian consumers have a high level of mistrust when it comes to food labels and marketing. That was a key takeaway in a

recent report from the Canadian Centre for Food Integrity. The report showed that 62 per cent of Canadians have concerns about misleading food labels and marketing. Read more...

#### Immigration and Foreign Workers

Surge of Western Canada businesses looking to hire temporary foreign workers. According to statistics provided by Employment and Social Development Canada, as of Nov. 5, the number of Labour Market Impact Assessment applications – the first step toward hiring a temporary foreign worker – has increased 39 per cent nationwide compared to the same period last year. In Western Canada, the increase was even higher at 83 per cent. Read more...

New humanitarian pathway for Colombian, Haitian and Venezuelan foreign nationals launched.

Canada announced Nov. 17 that it will be providing an alternative to irregular migration by welcoming 15,000 people through a family-based humanitarian pathway in addition to existing programs. The Honourable Marc Miller, Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship, announced that the dedicated humanitarian pathway will provide permanent residence to Colombian, Haitian and Venezuelan foreign nationals. The pathway is now open for applications. Read more...

## People, Wages and Workplace Culture

Plus d'argent pour les producteurs en difficulté. <u>Drew Spoelstra elected Ontario Federation of Agriculture president</u>. Drew Spoelstra, a dairy and crop farmer from Binbrook, Ont., has been elected as the new president of the Ontario

Federation of Agriculture (OFA). Spoelstra was chosen to the lead the provincial farm lobby at an executive meeting following the conclusion of the organization's annual convention in Toronto last week. He has served on the OFA board as the director representing farmers from Halton, Hamilton/Wentworth and Niagara since 2013 and has most recently held the role of vice president. Read more...

Ottawa takes stance on right to repair. The federal government is siding with Canadian farmers on the right-to-repair debate. A statement from the federal government calls for an adjustment to the Competition Act that would prevent manufacturers from refusing to provide the means of device and product repair in an "anti-competitive manner." That would presumably include certain software and modules on farm equipment that has been off limits to equipment owners. Read more...

OFA recognizes five young leaders at annual convention. Five young people currently pursuing future careers in agriculture have each won a bursary of \$2,000 from the Ontario Federation of Agriculture (OFA). The undergraduate, postgraduate and apprenticeship awards were presented at the OFA's Annual General Meeting in Toronto Nov. 20. Read more...

## Automation and Technology

Ag productivity gain rate is shrinking. Canadian agriculture productivity is growing, but the rate of growth is slowing. The comments came during a discussion with Fred Wall, FCC's vice president of marketing and digital agriculture, at the Agriculture Enlightened conference in Winnipeg Oct. 26. Productivity growth is still strong in the labour sector, but agriculture will have to embrace advances like artificial intelligence in machinery if it wants that aspect of the industry to keep pace. \$25-million program aims to boost agri-food innovation in Ontario. The Agri-Tech Innovation Initiative will disperse \$25 million in Sustainable Canadian Agricultural Partnership funding to drive agriculture and food sector production capacity and energy efficiency. Cost-share programs like this one help agriculture businesses fund changes in their business that keep

them competitive. Funding applications open on Feb. 15, 2024, and could provide up to \$100,000 for innovative technology and equipment projects. Read more...

Canada, B.C. supporting B.C. farmers with access to technology. B.C. farmers looking to grow their businesses in the face of rising costs are getting support for accessing new technologies from items such as robotic and automated equipment, farm management software and digital sensors, which will help them increase production, efficiency and profitability. The new B.C. On-Farm Technology Adoption Program will provide as much as \$3 million over the next two years from the governments of Canada and British Columbia. Read more...

<u>Protein industries Canada expands call for AI projects</u>. Protein Industries Canada is opening an expanded call for projects under the Pan-Canadian Artificial Intelligence Strategy. This call will consider projects that span the entire agriculture and food value-chain, from seed genetics to on-farm production through to ingredient manufacturing, food processing and logistics. As AI continues to make inroads into agriculture and food, it will be an important tool to improve the industry in the face of evolving challenges. <u>Read more...</u>

## Skill Development

Olds College launches new indoor certificate program. Olds College of Agriculture & Technology in Alberta is launching its Indoor Agriculture Certificate program, the first of its kind offered in Canada. Designed to meet the surging demand for skilled professionals in the controlled environment agriculture (CEA) sector, this four-month program will equip students with the knowledge and hands-on experience for a fulfilling career in controlled environment agriculture, addressing the growing demand for sustainable and high-tech farming methods.
