Industry Perceptions and Awareness

Ag's environmental record shines on the world stage. The World Bank recently released a report called Recipe for a Livable Planet: Achieving Net Zero Emissions in the AgriFood System. It concluded with this: "The food system must be fixed because it is making the planet ill and is a big slice of the climate change pie." Unfortunately, that was likely to be the headline on any story that the mainstream media produced about this report, augmenting the lack of understanding that much of urban Canada has about modern agriculture. <u>Canadian durum looks good but troubles lurk elsewhere</u>. Canada's durum crop is off to a good start, but there are problems in many other regions, says an analyst. The big question in the durum market is what will Turkey do this year? The country shocked the durum market by exporting an estimated 1.5 million tonnes of the crop in 2023-24, disrupting sales from other exporters. Read more...

Parliamentary Secretary Drouin announces over \$9.6 million to help the Canadian pork industry to prevent and prepare for a possible African swine fever outbreak. The Government of Canada is protecting the resilience of Canada's rural communities and the Canadian pork sector by supporting prevention and preparedness measures for African swine fever (ASF). ASF is a viral disease that only impacts pigs. While it has not been found in Canada to date, as it spreads around the globe, it poses a significant risk to the health of the Canadian swine herd, the pork industry, and the Canadian economy. People and Workplace Culture

US, Mexican, and Canadian cattle producers unite to protect production. Leaders from North American cattle groups are uniting to protect cattle production in Canada, the U.S., and Mexico. The groups, the National Cattlemen's Beef Association, the Confederación Nacional de Organizaciones Ganaderas (CNOG), and the Canadian Cattle Association (CCA), have signed a joint statement asking for greater oversight of emerging lab-grown proteins, protection of cattle from animal diseases, and promotion of the cattle industry's sustainability. Manitoba Crop Alliance sets new course. Five years post-amalgamation, the Manitoba Crop Alliance is well established, according to chief executive officer Pam de Rocquigny. Now, the multi-commodity farm group's new strategic plan is looking to future opportunities. The organization is ready to look forward and 'move the needle,' the CEO says. Read more...

Ontario asparagus growers use sustainable growing techniques. Asparagus - It's the first fruit and vegetable field crop of the season marking the unofficial start of spring. And it signals the abundance of local options that will soon be available from Ontario growers. Sustainability is at the core of Ontario's asparagus farming, with growers employing techniques such as planting cover crops to naturally control weeds and prevent soil erosion. Growers are also reducing the

carbon footprint of harvesting, such as transitioning to electric versions of the harvesting carts used to pick asparagus by hand. Read more...

Immigration and Foreign Workers

Agriculture industry wary of federal immigration plan. The 2024 federal budget's promise to reduce "temporary immigration" could reduce the number of temporary foreign workers available to Canadian agriculture and agricultural businesses. The document states the government "will reduce the share of temporary residents in Canada to five per cent of the total population over the next three years." Read more...

Ontario's compensation change to migrant worker program needs to be expanded, says lawyer. Maryth Yachnin calls it a good first step by the Workplace Safety and Insurance Board (WSIB) to change how it compensates migrant workers who are hurt on the job. "We are happy to see that as a first step towards some sort of fairness, for injured migrant workers in Ontario," said the lawyer with the Industrial Accident Victims Group of Ontario (IAVGO). However, she says, "it's certainly not, all the way. They're not even close." Read more...

Automation and Technology

Winter canola creating a buzz in Ontario. Winter canola fields are popping up all over Ontario. Across the province, acreage for the entire oilseed crop typically checks in around 40,000 acres, with about one third of the crop being planted in the fall, the rest being spring canola. Over the past five years, however, winter canola has been gaining momentum in the province, having increased from just 500 acres in 2019 to an estimated 12,000 acres in 2024. Read more...

<u>Plant sensors could act as an early warning system for farmers</u>. Using a pair of sensors made from carbon nanotubes, researchers from MIT have discovered signals that reveal when plants

are experiencing stresses such as heat, light, or attack from insects or bacteria. The sensors detect two signaling molecules that plants use to coordinate their response to stress: hydrogen peroxide and salicylic acid. Researchers found that plants produce these molecules at different times for each type of stress, creating distinctive patterns that could serve as an early warning system. Read more...

New fusarium head blight risk mapping tool launched for Prairie farmers. Farmers across Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba have access to a new risk mapping tool for assessing fusarium head blight (FHB), fusarium damaged kernels, and deoxynivalenol (DON) risk levels in spring wheat, winter wheat, barley and durum based on weather conditions. The weather-based risk is calculated using real-time weather data from more than 500 stations operated by Environment and Climate Change Canada, the Manitoba AgWeather Program, Saskatchewan Public Safety, Alberta Climate Information System and Metos Canada. Adventurous Grades six to eight classes across Canada embarked on an exciting sustainability journey in spring 2024 as the first explorers in Agriculture in the Classroom Canada's (AITC-C) new Mission Explorium competition. Mission Explorium, which launched on February 19 and wrapped up in late April, challenged students from coast to coast to build a sustainable community after landing on a deserted island. Four weeks of cross-curricular activities engaged classes to work together to complete a quest each week that included work in science, math, language arts, visual arts and careers. Read more...
